e. Chaplain. Prior to 5 May infantry battalions were provided chaplains by the brigades to which they were OPCON. The frequent shifting of battalions between brigades during Operation TEXAS STAR caused significant problems in chaplain coverage. Chaplain coverage was stabilized by assuring that the brigade chaplain who had habitually covered specific infantry battalions continued to cover those battalions regardless of tactical operational control relationships.
